DEMOCRATS DELIVER FOR NATIVE COMMUNITIES:

OVER FOUR YEARS, SECURED LARGEST FEDERAL INVESTMENT IN U.S. HISTORY

As Chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs (SCIA), **Senator Brian Schatz (D-HI)** led Senate Democrats in securing more than \$45 billion in dedicated funding to Native communities – the most in U.S. history – and shepherded **26 Tribal-specific bills into law** during his leadership. Over four years, the Committee made critical investments in key areas, including health care, housing, education, languages, infrastructure, and public safety through the **American Rescue Plan Act** (ARPA) (<u>P.L. 117-2</u>), the **Bipartisan Infrastructure Law** (BIL) (<u>P.L. 117-58</u>), the **Inflation Reduction Act** (IRA) (<u>P.L. 117-169</u>), and annual appropriations.

ISSUE AREA FUNDING & LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS

HOUSING

Advanced Legislation to Reauthorize the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act (NAHASDA)

- <u>S. 2285 Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 2023</u> passed in FY 2024 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) by a vote of <u>86-11</u> (118th Congress)
- <u>S. 2264 Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Reauthorization</u> Act of 2021 reported unanimously by the Committee (117th Congress)

Secured Critical Investment in Native American Housing

- Secured more than \$2.3 billion in FY 2023 and FY 2024 appropriations
 - \$1.344 billion for Native housing in the <u>FY 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)</u>, a \$324 million (32%) increase from FY 2023, to address historic underfunding compared to the total HUD budget --
 - \$1.1 billion (41% increase) for NAHASDA Indian Housing Block Grant program
 - \$75 million for the NAHASDA Indian Community Development Block Grant program for Native families to obtain new homes, make renovations, build community facilities, and receive housing services
 - \$22 million for the Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grant program
 - \$1 billion for Native housing in the <u>FY 2023 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 117-328)</u>
- Secured more than \$1.2 billion in ARPA
 - o \$750 million NAHASDA programs at HUD
 - o **\$498 million** for a new Homeowner Assistance Program for Tribes to prevent homeowner mortgage foreclosures a Treasury

HEALTH CARE

Secured Advance Appropriations for the Indian Health Service (IHS) for the First Time Ever

Beginning in FY 2023, provided current and next year funding in both the <u>FY 2024</u>
 <u>Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)</u> and the <u>FY 2023 Consolidated</u>
 <u>Appropriations Act (P.L. 117-328)</u> for essential health care programs to prevent service disruptions from government shutdowns or lapses in annual appropriations funding

Increased Funding for Native Health Care

• Secured more than \$24 billion in <u>ARPA</u> and FY 2022, FY 2023, FY 2024 appropriations for Native health care, including for IHS and Native Hawaiian Health Care Systems

- **Secured nearly \$7 billion** for Native health care in the <u>FY 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)</u> -
 - o \$27 million for the Native Hawaiian Health Care Systems
 - o \$6.96 billion for the IHS
 - \$4.9 billion for Health Services and \$813 million for Health Facilities, which includes funding for the staffing of new facilities
 - Fully funded Contract Support Costs and Payments for Tribal Leases
 - Provided advance appropriations for FY 2025

Created New Native Behavioral Health Resources; Advanced Health Care Workforce Parity and Health Care Needs of Native Elders

- Authorized \$80 million in the <u>FY 2023 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 117-328)</u> in annual appropriations for four fiscal years for Native communities' behavioral health needs
- Passed S. 3022 IHS Workforce Parity Act of 2024 by the Senate in the 118th Congress
- Passed <u>S. 4776 Older Americans Act Reauthorization Act of 2024</u> by the Senate in the 118th Congress
 - Included <u>S. 4273 Native ELDER Act</u>, which would improve federal programs and services to provide support and flexible services for American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian elders to age in place

PUBLIC SAFETY & JUSTICE

Protecting Native Children, Women, and Law Enforcement Officers in Indian Country, Alaska, and Hawai'i

- Secured more than \$2.1 billion to address public safety needs in Native communities, and addressed the crisis of Missing and Murdered Indigenous People (MMIP) and fentanyl and opioid abuse in Native communities
- Enacted the S. 3263 VAWA Reauthorization of 2022 (P.L. 117-103)
 - Restored Tribal jurisdiction to crimes by non-Indians of child violence, sexual violence, sex trafficking, stalking, obstruction of justice, and assault of Tribal justice personnel in Indian Country
- Enacted S. 7 VAWA Technical Amendments of 2022 (P.L. 117-315)
 - o Clarified that Native Hawaiian Organizations (NHOs) have access to federal grants to serve survivors of domestic and other violence
- Enacted <u>S. 5087 A Bill to Extend the Not Invisible Act Commission for 18 Months (P.L.</u> 117-350)
 - Provided additional time for the joint <u>Not Invisible Act Commission</u>, authorized by the <u>Not Invisible Act of 2019 (P.L. 116-166)</u>, to transmit its <u>recommendations</u> to combat the MMIP crisis to the U.S. Department of the Interior, the U.S. Department of Justice, and Congress
- **Passed** *S.* 465 *BADGES for Native Communities Act* through the Senate in the 118th Congress
- Held multiple events relating to public safety issues, including examining federal resources to combat the fentanyl, opioid, and MMIP crises -

INDIAN WATER RIGHTS SETTLEMENTS

Secured funding and enacted Indian water rights legislation

- **Secured \$2.5 billion** to complete water rights settlements ratified as of November 15, 2022, through **BIL**
- Enacted \$925.5 million and provided water-certainty for Tribal and surrounding communities by securing access to clean, reliable water and infrastructure -
 - o <u>S. 3168 Amendments to the White Mountain Apache Water Rights Quantification</u> Act of 2010 (P.L. 117-342)
 - o S.3308 Colorado River Indian Tribes Water Resiliency Act of 2022 (P.L. 117-343)
 - o S.4104 Hualapai Tribe Water Rights Settlement Act of 2022 (P.L. 117-349)

Advanced the largest number of water settlement bills in a single Congress

- In the 118th Congress, ushered **12 Indian water rights settlement bills, totaling more than** \$12 billion, through Committee hearings and business meetings, to address the water rights and water security of 21 Tribes across 5 states -

TRIBAL HOMELANDS

11 Bills Enacted into Law to Help Rebuild Tribal Homelands

- <u>S. 108 To Authorize the Seminole Tribe of Florida to Lease of Transfer Certain Land</u> (P.L. 117-65)
 - Authorizes the Seminole Tribe of Florida to lease, sell, convey, warrant, or transfer any real property it owns that is not held in trust
- H.R.478 The Blackwater Trading Post Land Transfer Act (P.L. 117-267)
 - Takes approximately 55 acres in Pinal County, Arizona, into trust for the benefit of the Gila River Indian Community of Arizona
- H.R.4881 Old Pascua Community Land Acquisition Act (P.L. 117-275)
 - Takes approximately 30 acres of Tribally-owned land in Tucson in Pima County, Arizona, into trust for the benefit of the Pascua Yaqui Tribe of Arizona
- <u>H.R.897 The Agua Caliente Land Exchange Fee to Trust Confirmation Act (P.L. 117-329)</u>
 - o Takes approximately 2,560 acres in Palm Springs, California, into trust for the benefit of the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians of California
- <u>S. 3773 To Authorize Leases of up to 99 Years for the Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation (P.L. 117-346)</u>
 - Authorizes the Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation of Washington to lease lands held in trust for their benefit for up to 99 years
- S.4439 Katimiîn and Ameekyáaraam Sacred Lands Act (P.L. 117-353)
 - Takes approximately 1,031 acres of federal land in Siskiyou County and Humboldt County, California, into trust for the benefit of the Karuk Tribe of California
- H.R.423 Pala Band of Mission Indians Land Transfer Act of 2023 (P.L. 118-11)
 - Takes approximately 721 acres in San Diego County, California, into trust for the benefit of the Pala Band of Mission Indians of California
- H.R. 2839 To Amend the Siletz Reservation Act (P.L. 118-33)
 - O Provides for a process by which Oregon and the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians of Oregon may amend or replace a 1980 agreement defining Tribal hunting, fishing, trapping, and gathering rights
- S.382 Puyallup Tribe of Indians Land into Trust Confirmation Act of 2023 (P.L. 118-48)
 - Takes approximately 17 acres in Pierce County, Washington, into trust for the benefit of the Puyallup Tribe of Washington
- H.R. 1240 Winnebago Land Transfer Act of 2023 (P.L. 118-180)
 - o Takes approximately 1,585 acres in Woodbury County and Monona County, Iowa, into trust for the benefit of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska
- S. 3857 Jamul Indian Village Land Transfer Act (P.L. 118-199)
 - Takes approximately 172.1 acres in San Diego, California, into trust for the benefit of the Jamul Indian Village of California

INFRASTRUCTURE

Established a New Program for Tribal Telecommunications and Secured Direct Funding

• \$3 billion in ARPA and BIL for the Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program, a new program at the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) to provide direct funding to Tribes for greater broadband access

Addressed Longstanding Tribal Transportation Funding Backlogs

- More than \$3.9 billion in <u>BIL</u> to address backlogs of Tribal roads, bridges, and transportation projects at the U.S. Department of Transportation
- \$175.5 million in new funding in the <u>FY 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)</u> --
 - \$25 million for the Rural and Tribal Infrastructure Advancement Pilot Program to improve Tribal access
 - o \$150 million for the Tribal Transportation Program (TTP)

Funded Water and Sanitation Backlogs to Bring Clean, Safe, Reliable Drinking Water and Wastewater into More Tribal Communities

- \$3.5 billion in BIL to the Indian Health Service (IHS) for backlogged projects to improve drinking water and wastewater access to Tribal households
- **\$868 million** for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in the <u>BIL</u> and <u>IRA</u> for drinking water (\$614 million) and wastewater (\$254 million) infrastructure for Tribes
- Over **\$1 billion** in federal funding to <u>build out Tribal water and sanitation infrastructure</u> through a **Schatz-led provision** in the BIL and IRA
- \$15 million in FY 2021 to Tribes and Tribal organizations in ARPA to assist with high-cost water and waste-water services

ENERGY

Secured Historic Investment in Tribal Energy Development

- More than \$660 million for Tribal energy and electrification projects, including -
 - o \$75 million in Tribal direct loans for energy development the largest in history
 - \$72 million in the <u>IRA</u> to 21 Tribes in FY 2024 for home electrification projects through a **Schatz-authored provision**
- \$20 billion in available loan guarantees for Tribal energy development a tenfold increase

CLIMATE

Commitment to Addressing Climate Change and Native Communities

- More than \$1.76 billion to support climate resiliency, environmental protection, and natural resources management efforts in Native communities, including -
 - o \$216 million for Tribal climate adaptation and resilience in BIL
 - o \$220 million for Tribal climate adaptation and resilience in IRA

- \$23.5 million for climate adaptation and resiliency in the Native Hawaiian Community in the IRA
- \$145.5 million for unelectrified homes transitioning to zero-emission systems and retrofitting in the IRA
- Secured Tribal tax priorities for energy efficiency and clean energy in the <u>IRA</u>
 - o Included Tribes in Section 48 tax credits for solar and wind facilities
 - o Included Tribes and Alaska Native Corporations in elective pay tax credits, Section 17D tax credits for energy efficient buildings, and Section 30D(6) clean vehicle tax credits
 - o Included Tribal lands and Tribally-designated housing authorities as tax multipliers for Sect 48C clean electricity investment tax credit

Funded Infrastructure Projects for the Native Hawaiian Community to Bolster Climate Resilience

• Awarded \$20 million to 17 Native Hawaiian Organizations for climate adaptation projects made possible by a Schatz-authored provision in the IRA

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Growing Native Businesses and Investment Opportunities

- \$500 million to grow Native-owned small businesses, facilitate access to capital, and boost economic development in Native communities in ARPA
- \$28 million in loan principal to the Native CDFI Fund <u>FY 2024 Consolidated</u> Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)

Secured Senate-passage of Tribal leasing and rights-of-way authority legislation

- S. 1322 Unlocking Tribal Lands and Opportunities for Commerce and Key Economic Developments (UNLOCKED) Act of 2023
 - o Schatz-authored bill would extend the lease period for trust and other lands to 99 years and provide Tribes with enhanced authority to grant rights-of-way on their own lands

Funding available for programs that support cultural education for visitors in Hawai'i

• \$1 million in new federal grant funding available for cultural tourism, empowering the Native Hawaiian community, made possible by the NATIVE Act, federal law authored by Senator Schatz.

EDUCATION & NATIVE LANGUAGES

Establishing a Federal Commission to Heal from Indian Boarding School Era

- Passed Senator Warren's <u>S. 1723 Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding</u> <u>School Policies Act</u> to support healing from the legacy of federal Indian Boarding Schools out of the Senate in the 118th Congress
- Held oversight hearing on Volume 1 of the Department of the Interior's Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative

• Senator Schatz led a bipartisan group of Senators to <u>speak on the Senate floor</u> on the dark history of Indian Boarding Schools and the progress being made on the Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding Schools Policies Act

Continuing Efforts to Revitalize Native Languages through New Laws and Annual Appropriations

- Enacted Chairman Schatz's <u>S. 1402 Durbin Feeling Native American Languages Act of</u> 2022 (P.L. 117-45), which improves interagency coordination to advance Native American languages
- Enacted Chairman Schatz's <u>S. 989 Native American Language Resource Center Act of</u> <u>2022 (P.L. 117-335)</u>, which includes more than <u>\$2.2 million</u> in new grant funding and established national language resource centers to support revitalization efforts
- More than \$5.7 billion in the <u>FY 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)</u> for Native education programs at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, U.S. Department of Education, and the U.S. Department of the Interior
- More than \$15 million in the <u>FY 2024 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-42)</u> for Native language revitalization programs at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (Esther Martinez Immersion and Preservation & Maintenance programs)

Nearly Doubled Funding for Native Education and Languages

- More than \$2.7 billion in ARPA and FY 2022 and FY 2023 appropriations for Native education programs at the U.S. Department of Education and the Bureau of Indian Education
- \$127 million in ARPA and FY 2022 and FY 2023 appropriations for Native languages and cultural heritage

CHILDREN & FAMILIES

Secured Historic Investment in Native Children and Families

• More than \$2.4 billion in ARPA, and FY 2022 and FY 2023 appropriations for programs serving Native children and families at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, U.S. Department of Education, and the U.S. Department of the Interior

Reauthorized Tribal-Specific Child Abuse and Treatment Programs for the First Time since the 1990s

- H.R. 663 Native American Child Protection Act (P.L. 118-160)
 - Creates a path for direct set-aside funding for Tribal-specific child abuse prevention and treatment programs by modernizing and reauthorizing the Indian Child Abuse Treatment Grant Program at the Indian Health Service and the Indian Child Protection and Family Violence Prevention Program and the Indian Child Resource and Family Services Centers at the Bureau of Indian Affairs to prevent and treat child abuse

CULTURAL PATRIMONY & INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

Safeguarding Tribes' cultural patrimony from illegal possession, sale, and exportation

- Enacted <u>H.R. 2930 Safeguard Tribal Objects of Patrimony (STOP) Act of 2021 (P.L. 117-258)</u>
 - Responds to and prevents the export of Native American cultural items held in violation of current federal laws for sale in foreign countries and establishes a process to repatriate such items
- Held <u>oversight hearing on implementation of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act</u> (NAGPRA) and co-led <u>bipartisan letters</u> to 71 institutions and museums holding Native American cultural items, including human remains, urging them to expeditiously comply with the NAGPRA
- In a floor speech, Chairman Schatz demanded institutions comply with NAGPRA and return Native cultural remains and items pursuant to the law
- Held a <u>listening session</u> and presented <u>draft legislation</u>, the *ARTIST Act*, to update the American Indian Arts and Crafts Act (IACA)

- Glenn Teves of Hawai'i to serve on the Tribal Advisory Committee at the U.S. Department of Agriculture
